SEEKING SAFETY

Refugee claimants are those who cross international borders seeking reprieve from their trauma and safety from persecution. In 2019, 3850 refugee claimants arrived in British Columbia. In 2020, with the pandemic causing border closures and restrictions on international travel, there were still 2165 refugee claims made in BC.

In 2021, there is pent-up demand for those who are forcibly displaced to move to spaces of refuge. Government agencies are partnering with local organizations to plan and prepare for an anticipated surge in refugee claimant arrivals when the borders reopen.

Many of the people who arrive in Canada seeking refugee protection face numerous challenges and vulnerabilities. No one is there to meet them at the airport or border. They have no idea where to go or what to do next. Refugee claimants struggle to navigate complex systems and to meet their basic needs like finding shelter. Connecting to social networks, to people they can trust, is something they long for, yet struggle to make happen.

You can help.



There are people in our world facing crisis.

They are losing their homes, mourning the disappearance of loved ones, experiencing torture, receiving death threats, hiding from "ethnic cleansing", and facing possible imprisonment. Why?

Perhaps they possess the wrong physical traits, they follow the wrong religion or they choose to speak up for the oppressed. The reasons for their endangerment are many, but one thing unites them – they have all made the courageous decision to seek safety and justice, sacrificing everything to make it to Canada with the hope of starting a new life here.

A refugee claimant is a person who has fled their country and is asking for protection in another country. We don't know whether a claimant is a refugee or not until their case has been decided.

THINGS YOU CAN DO

VOLUNTEER

There are so many ways to volunteers with agencies and ministries that serve refugee claimants. They have all kinds of events, community dinners, friendship opportunities and more. Whether you like to cook, can do home maintenance or yard work, there's something you'll be able to do. And once you're involved you'll get to meet the incredible people who have travelled across the world to find safety in Canada. It'll be an amazing experience. Plus, there are as many opportunities as there are ideas - so just contact your local agency to find out more.

TEACH ENGLISH

Do you have experience teaching English? Are you a certified ESL teacher? Then there are often lots of ways you can get involved - conversation circles, one-on-one lessons, group lessons, online lessons and more. English skills are vital to the success of refugee claimants in BC - so why not put your teaching ability and experience to incredible use by working with refugee claimants?

EDUCATE YOUR SMALL GROUP

If you care about refugee claimants and the issues around seeking protection, why not involve your small group or community group? You could hold a Bible study using refuge as a theme, or hold a book club using <u>Refugee Reimagined</u> as your book choice. Become an ambassador for refugee claimants in your network!

PRACTICE WELCOME

And if you want to "dive deep" into supporting refugee claimants, there are some amazing ways groups and individuals can practice welcome. Many agencies will have schemes where you can help to provide accommodation for people seeking refugee protection. PRAY

CONNECT

Don't be a stranger! Connect with our agencies and find out what we do and how it could fit with your church's mission and outreach. We're always happy to provide guest speakers to talk to your folks and it's often a great way to network and find out what's happening to support refugee claimants in your community.

HOUSING

The pandemic has caused many churches to think about how they use their buildings and land - some are even thinking of using parking lots of affordable housing. We'd love to partner in these plans to expand the capacity for housing refugee claimants and have lots of ideas and experience to help. But it doesn't have to be as drastic as that - we would love to talk more with your community on how we can utilize rooms, suites, basements and more!

FUNDRAISE

Many agencies get very limited government or municipal funding so rely on donations and some grant funding.
